Preserving Wildlife Habitat

Each of us has to live somewhere, and wherever we live, not much else lives. We're not evil, just incompatible with natural ecosystems. Fortunately, we can significantly ease the pressure we exert.

When a couple in the US chooses to not add another of us, 14 football fields of potential wildlife habitat are saved for 79 years. Not co-creating two more of us saves 28 football fields. Congratulations!

When we begin to ease our pressures on wildlife habitat, restoration of natural ecosystems will achieve success.

Malthus Was Wrong

Rev. Robert Malthus was wrong to oppose contraception, but he changed his mind later. He was not wrong to state that we will increase our numbers up to the limits of our food supply, and then many would starve. More than two billion people experience severe to moderate food insecurity today: twice the total human population of Earth in 1798 when he wrote *An Essay on the Principle of Population*.

With a shrinking population, we could finally end world hunger.

Who are VHEMT Volunteers?

People support the Voluntary Human Extinction Movement (VHEMT) for a variety of reasons, often overlapping.

Some simply don't want to be parents and choose to remain childfree. Antinatalists feel it's ethical to avoid creating new humans, preventing all suffering their life would entail. Many environmentalists understand that the less habitat we use, the more habitat wildlife will have. Humanitarians know we'll be better able to care for existing people, and peaceful relationships between peoples might be achieved with fewer of us. Advocates for non-human animal rights realize that our extinction would eliminate all suffering of domesticated animals such as livestock and us.

What reasons might **you** have for supporting VHEMT?

Population Momentum

In 1950, the global average Total Fertility Rate was 5.0. Today, it's only 2.4. Hooray! However, in 1950 we were only increasing by 47 million per year, and today it's about 80 million: nearly double the increase at half the fertility. Rates are multiplied by a larger base number, so we get exponential momentum.

So-called Replacement Level Fertility of 2.1 is a convenient untruth that makes it seem as if that creating two offspring merely replaces ourselves. Really, it more than doubles our environmental impact.

Rather than stopping at two, we need to stop at once.

Does VHEMT favor abortion?

Only if someone is pregnant and doesn't want to be. Men have a big role to play in preventing unwanted conceptions. By choosing to support condoms and get vasectomies, men will avoid impregnating women who don't want to conceive, gestate, and give birth.

Natalism: the oldest ideology


Natalism, or pro-natalism, is a deeply held social attitude that's so ingrained it's nearly invisible. All human societies have evolved to be natalist: treating births as an unquestioned benefit for the community. This began before we knew how babies were made.

Our fecund strategy worked well for our species, and as our populations grew, it became essential for survival. If a tribe didn't produce more members, another tribe would eventually encroach on their territory and likely displace them.

Today, encouraging procreation without question continues, in spite of the fact that our tremendous success has become detrimental to our very survival. The realization that we should stop procreating contradicts hundreds of thousands of years of cultural evolution, so we're naturally resistant to the idea at first.

It can be a challenge to accept that not procreating is a distinctively positive action for family, society, Earth, and especially for the non-existent new human. Couples who have already sired offspring should not feel guilty. It's the future that counts: by not creating more than we already have, we'll be better able to take care of existing people, including our own children.

Let's feed 'em, not breed 'em.



Thinking of the Children

Many of us are concerned for the future of our children and grandchildren, and their children and grandchildren, though they'll be adults three times longer than they're children.

Short sighted thinking can inhibit rational, lifelong decisions. When we say, "Have a baby" or "Have a child," we might also give some thought to the 60 years they'll spend as an adult.

Just a suggestion.

With a normal life span, anyone born today could live into the 22nd century, so thinking long term might be a good idea.

Reproductive Freedom

The right to procreate is fiercely defended, but the right **not** to procreate faces restrictions everywhere: ranging from inconvenient to violent and even deadly. Natalist cultures, enforced by the patriarchy, deny women the freedom they need to live autonomously. They're often coerced and, at times, forced into motherhood. This is not nice.

Although both are violations of human rights, consequences of forcing a woman or girl to conceive and give birth are far graver than restricting the freedom to choose to procreate would be. A more humane and caring world is possible.

Providing everyone with their basic human right to choose whether or not to procreate—including the necessary reproductive health care services—would make it more likely that anyone born is wanted and will be as well cared for as conditions allow.

Looking on the Bright Side

A groundswell of awareness, bubbling beneath the surface of world consciousness, promises to burst forth and shift humanity's worldview in the coming years. Although a sizable proportion of us has arrived at the awareness that the intentional co-creation of one more of us can't be justified today, a spiral of silence continues to keep it hidden, for now.

Fewer deaths

Reducing human deaths is a major goal of the Voluntary Human Extinction Movement. Peacefully phasing ourselves out by not procreating will avoid the brutal involuntary extinction our over-industrialized civilzation is working so hard to bring about. Potential humans left unconceived will remain in peaceful non-existence, and will never die.
